  - Update <u>School Procurement Guidance</u> on combatting modern slavery and labour exploitation workshop took place on 23 Mag
  - Update Supply Chain Mapping Protocol workshop scheduled for workshop scheduled for 9 October
  - Develop due diligence maturity guidance (aligned with BS25700 and the ISO currently under development) to use the existing functionality in the School e.g. like the procurement or sustainability assessment waiting for approval to use existing functionality

### 8 Operational Toolkit – update

Format of toolkit – scene setting -> current landscape of built environment -> why we need to take action -> insights from Operation Cardinas -> key parts of toolkit.

Focuses on 6 key risks. It states the risks and then the high-level actions you need to take and then links to resources that will help.

### Purpose of the toolkit:

- Support anyone involved in setting up or operating a site to address modern slavery and labour exploitation
- Brings together site specific, actionable insights and recommendations from various reports across the built environment sector into one place.
- Directs you to wealth of free resources in different formats such as posters, toolbox talks and videos.

The toolkit will NOT provide a competency framework or job roles as there is a limited budget towards producing it and these fall outside of this remit.

9	Modern Slavery Intelligence Network for Built Environment  Partners had suggested that built environment sector could benefit from a platform to enable anonymous reporting of findings/insights similar to the MSIN set up in the agriculture and food industry.  The niche of an MSIN is about sharing intelligence, networks and data. It is not about upskilling people.  Overview of current MSIN in agriculture and food industry:  12 founding members, now 20 are paying membership (up to 3k for membership fees). Plan is to move up to 35 members by end of 2024.  Smaller businesses pay less, minimum is £250.  It took 18 months to get the founding partners aligned and develop robust processes which allowed them to convert data into a database that everyone could be confident was secure.  The owner of the MSIN uploads the insights to the platform and, at first, only the owner and 'Stop the Traffik' (STT) can see it.  Once the insight/submission has been checked and confirmed as robust/accurate then it is shared with other members and anonymised.  External organisations such as Met police are invited to join quarterly meetings and present case studies/findings to the MSIN.  Idea will be to build on the existing platform and not to recreate a new one. Ideal	Partners & EJ
